The flag folding ceremony represents the same religious principles on which our country was originally founded.

The portion of the flag denoting honor is the canton of blue containing the stars representing the states our veterans served in uniform. The canton field of blue dresses from left to right and is inverted when draped as a pall on the casket of a veteran who has served our country in uniform.

In the armed forces of the United States, at the ceremony of retreat, the flag is lowered, folded in a triangular fold and kept under watch throughout the night as a tribute to our nation's Honored Dead.

The next morning, it is brought out and, at the ceremony of reveille, run aloft as a symbol of our belief in the RESURRECTION of the BODY.
